The U.S. Constitution and the Spirit of America

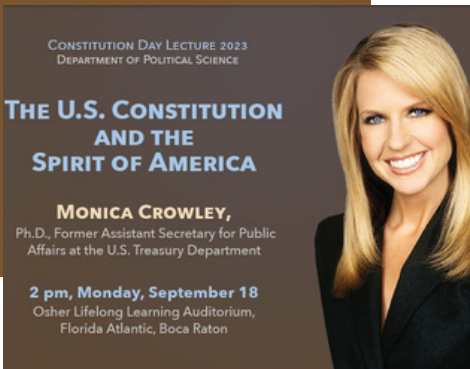

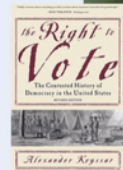
