COE Highlights

HERBST NAMED SUPERINTENDENT

Valerie J. Bristor, Ph.D., Dean of the College of Education (COE), announced that Joel D. Herbst, Ed.D., Assistant Dean, PK-12 Schools & Educational Programs, has been appointed by

Assistant Dean, PK-12 Schools & Educational Programs, and Superintendent Florida Atlantic University (FAU) President John W. Kelly, Ph.D., as Superintendent of FAU Lab Schools (Florida School District 72) effective July 1, 2018. The District comprises the <u>Alexander D. Henderson School</u> (ADHUS), <u>FAU High School</u>, and <u>Palm Pointe Educational Research School at Tradition</u>.

"His work as Assistant Dean of PK-12 Schools and Educational programs has been exceptional since he came on board in April 2012," stated Bristor. "FAUS is extremely fortunate to have him as Superintendent in addition to his role as Assistant Dean, which also includes oversight of the Pine Jog Environmental Educational Center and Karen Slattery Educational Research Center for Child Development."

Under Herbst's leadership, FAU Lab Schools was ranked fourth out of 3,332 Public and Charter Schools in the State of Florida and was the only Title 1 school among the top 10 schools in 2017. The FAU Lab Schools network was named a 2017 Google for

Education Reference District, one of only 109 districts in the world. FAU High launched the nation's first M.D. pipeline program in 2017 that places high school students from FAU High School directly in-line for medical school at FAU. That same year, ADHUS, FAU High and Palm Pointe were named Schools of Excellence by the Florida Department of Education. In June 2018, ADHUS/FAU High won first place in the 10th annual Green Schools Awards bestowed by FAU's Pine Jog Environmental Education Center.

Previously, Herbst served in the Broward County School Board Office as the South Area Superintendent of Schools. He has held leadership positions during 20 of his 29 years working in Florida's educational system.

Daniel Reyes-Guerra, Ph.D., Associate Professor, Educational Leadership and Research Methodology in Florida Atlantic University's College of Education, coordinates the School Leaders master's, specialist, and doctoral programs.

FACULTY FOCUS: REYES-GUERRA

Daniel Reyes-Guerra, Ph.D., Associate Professor, Educational Leadership and Research Methodology (ELRM), in Florida Atlantic University (FAU)'s College of Education is in the forefront of improving school leadership education programs. In fact, he is in his second year directing professional learning programs in partnership with local school districts thanks to the \$5.6 million Wallace Foundation grant awarded in 2016 (see article at right).

As a result, ELRM completely rewrote its School Leaders Master of Education program by co-constructing it with a committee of representatives from all four partnering districts. "What is important is the emphasis on social justice, social emotional learning and systems thinking," declared Reyes-Guerra. "Through our recruitment and selection process, we really look for people who are looking to make a difference and improve the lives of the students that they teach in the schools they will run."

Reyes-Guerra—as ELRM's School Leaders Program Coordinator—oversees the master's, specialist and doctoral programs in school leadership. In that role, he facilitates program faculty meetings to review curriculum and get faculty consensus on program business. He supervises administration functions, schedules courses and oversees recruitment and selection. In addition to teaching doctoral-level courses such as Executive Leadership, Seminar in Administration and School Improvement, Reyes-Guerra chairs or serves on dissertation committees. His research interests include internship, leadership and social justice, educational leadership policy and university—school district partnership.

Reyes-Guerra joined the University in 2002 as a Principal-in-Residence in ELRM's *Grow Your Own Program*, while earning a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership from FAU. He became an Assistant Professor in 2009. Previously, he was a Secondary Principal at the American School of Asuncion in Paraguay for seven years and a High School Principal at the Escuela Americana in El Salvador for three years. Prior to that, he taught English and social studies for a total of seven years at the American School of El Salvador and the American School of Guatemala. He holds a M.S. in Educational Administration from the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, and a B.A. in History and Government from Cornell University.

A past President of the Florida Association of Professors of Educational Leadership, he has been instrumental in shaping policy initiatives in leadership preparation. "We live in a State that is tied to high stakes accountability and that is based on student performance on standardized tests," noted Reyes-Guerra. Educational leaders "are trying to break from that and find other ways to measure success" and produce "democratic, critical thinking citizens."

FAU SCHOOL LEADERS PROGRAM PARTNERS WITH DISTRICTS, STATE

"The Wallace Foundation grant created an opportunity to focus on improving the educational leadership profession in the State of Florida," stated Daniel Reyes-Guerra, Ph.D., Associate Professor, Educational Leadership and Research Methodology (ELRM) and Principal Investigator for the Florida Atlantic University Principal Preparation Initiative (FAUPPI).

Reyes-Guerra, in partnership with the Florida Department of Education, convened State leaders and stakeholders in July 2018 for the second time to create a guiding vision for school leadership learning and development. The statewide task force has been brought together as part of the work of FAUPPI to prepare a report, including recommendations for aligning policy with that vision, for Florida's Commissioner of Education by Nov. 1, 2018.

The \$5.6 million grant the Wallace Foundation provided to FAU's College of Education also made possible the collaboration with local school districts to improve FAU's School Leaders preparation programs. "Literally the goal of the Wallace Foundation is to foster strong public schools, which they believe are crucial to ensuring equal opportunity for all Americans, an underpinning of our democracy," stated Reyes-Guerra.

Under the leadership of Reyes-Guerra, FAUPPI project has created professional learning programs that lead to state certification for principals and assistant principals. The idea is for these programs to serve as innovative and effective models for other universities and policymakers across the country.

The first step was to rewrite the ELRM School Leaders Masters in Education program with the help of district representatives. Now in the second year of the four-year grant, the second step is for each district-university partnership to implement the same basic curriculum, while making context-based changes so that it would meet each district's specific instructional framework and learning needs, explained Reves-Guerra.

These university-district partnership programs include Broward County Public Schools' Principal Rapid Orientation and Preparation in Educational Leadership (PROPEL), launched in 2011; the School District of Palm Beach County's Leadership for Excellence and Equity (ExEq); and St. Lucie Public Schools and Martin County School District's Educational Leadership Internship to Excellence (ELITE).

CCEI TEAMS UP WITH BROWARD SCHOOLS

Bill Bigelow, curriculum editor of *Rethinking Schools* and veteran High School Social Studies teacher, will be a guest speaker on Tuesday, Nov. 13, 2018 as part of the Educational Equity Partnership Project (EEPP). "He is probably one of the most prolific curriculum developers of multicultural and social justice curricula," noted Dilys Schoorman, Ph.D., Chair, Curriculum, Culture and Educational Inquiry (CCEI) in Florida Atlantic University (FAU)'s College of Education.

CCEI, in conjunction with the Division of Student Affairs, launched the EEPP project in collaboration with BCPS in fall 2017. Funded by a Teaching Incentive Fund (TIF) grant awarded to BCPS, EEPP offers selected Master Teachers in Title I schools professional development modules taught by CCEI faculty. Angela Brown, Director, Coaching and Induction, BCPS, is the Principal Investigator of the

TIF grant. A former Principal of Dillard Elementary, Brown was named 2015 Principal of the Year and was awarded the 2016 Shine Award by Florida Governor Rick Scott.

The goal of the TIF grant is to provide educators with research-

based strategies and resources to serve students of diverse populations better. The goal of the TIF programs is to increase the number of effective educators in highneeds schools in order to improve students' academic achievement. To that end, TIF funds projects that develop performance-based teacher compensation systems. "The EEPP project is intentionally collaborative," stated

When tragedy struck Marjory Stoneman Douglas (MSD) High School on Wednesday, February 14, 2018, three alumni, who graduated on May 3, 2018 from Florida Atlantic University (FAU)'s College of Education (COE), were student teaching at that high school. They emerged stronger and committed to the teaching profession. In fact, two of them are now teaching at MSD High School and the other, at Deerfield Beach Elementary School (DBES). Both schools are in the Broward County Public School District.

A graduate of MSD High School, Elizabeth Smith earned a B.A. degree in Exceptional Student Education with ESOL Endorsement from the COE's Department of Exceptional Student Education (ESE). She holds an ESE teaching position teaching in a second/third-grade classroom at Deerfield Beach Elementary School.

Lauren Rower received a B.A.E. degree in English Education from the COE's Department of Teaching and Learning (TL). She teaches ninth and tenth-grade English at MSD High School. Anthony Melei earned a B.A. in Social Studies Education from the COE's TL. He teaches ninth-grade geography at MSD High School.

Following the tragedy, Lisa Finnegan, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, ESE, recalled that Elizabeth was eager to assist MSD students readjust back to school and support one another because she was not only a student teacher, but was a former student of that high school as well. Robyn Klein, Ed.D., Field Director and Secondary Methods Instructor, TL, noted that both Lauren and Anthony exceeded the expectations of FAU interns and showed their support for the community.
